Human Values and Ethics

Value oriented education is the very essence of the vision and mission of our institution that aims towards the holistic development of our students. This objective is realized through the introduction of a number of core and non-core courses as a part of curriculum. Certain departments, cells, clubs and other units organize structured activities to develop qualities of Character, Secular Outlook, Spirit of Adventure and the ideals of Selfless Service amongst the Youth of the Country and thus prepare the youth for Nation building.

The practice of infusing values in the students begins in the first year. Our pupils take a mandatory 60 hours course in "Human Values and Ethics", as a part of AECC which accounts for a credit. The course has an examination in the end semester. They are further taught about Science & Environment in their second year of study which accounts for one credit. In a pursuit to give our students professional ethics, we provide a Skill Oriented Course on "Professional Image Building". A 4-credit course in semester IV for commerce students called "Business Ethics" is included in the curriculum. A **text book on Value education** compiled by Dr Rani George, Department of Nutrition is provided to the students. Human values are taught through the various languages as a part of their curriculum.


1. Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course - Human Values and Ethics Course

In order to address this issue and recognize the importance of life skills acquisition by students at UG level – "Human Values and Ethics" course was integrating it into the curriculum and is offered to all first-year students in the first semester.

This course equips the students with knowledge of life skills; exposes them to activities that bring about a positive change in attitudes; and provides a forum to

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
